Call to Order and Introductions – TAC Chair Bruce Eckard called the meeting to order and welcomed all present at 2:01 PM. Mr. Eckard mentioned the code of Ethics and a reminder to everyone about any conflicts. Mr. Eckard requested that introductions be made by all present. Mr. Eckard thanked everyone for their time and explained the items in the packet.

#### Action Items:

- I. Approval of Minutes (Attachment I) Mr. Eckard asked for a motion to approve the Minutes for the September 25, 2019 Meeting. From the TCC, Mr. Duncan offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Williams. The motion was unanimously approved by the TCC. From the TAC, Mr. Hodge offered a motion, seconded by Ms. Beatty. The motion was unanimously approved by the TAC.
- II. Transportation Improvement Programs (Attachment II)- Mr. Horton presented Revisions to the 2018-2027 and the 2020-2029 TIPs. Mr. Horton went into detail regarding this and reminded everyone that NCDOT is here today if there are any concerns. Mr. Williams asked a few questions regarding the project. Mr. Horton said we are seeking approval for project schedule modifications and for project additions. Mr. Eckard asked for a motion to approve the Minutes for the September 25, 2019 Meeting. From the TCC, Mr. Duncan offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Williams. The motion was unanimously approved by the TCC. From the TAC, Mr. Maynard offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Hodge. The motion was unanimously approved by the TAC.
- III. Federal Certification Review (Attachment III) Ms. Barren presented the Federal Certification Review that had been conducted for the MPO. The review was conducted in August 2019. One of the first things she wanted to commend the staff on was a great collaboration to work together. As part of the review, the Federal team found no corrective actions. Commendable items found by the review team included how the staff have visualized performance measures, completed freight planning, and targeted public involvement. Some of the areas that they recommend for improvement included splitting the TAC and TCC. Mr. Eckard asked questions and stated the board would be taking the calendar issue up shortly at this meeting. Ms. Barron will be back in two years to take a look at the recommendations given during the recent review and see where the MPO is, and determine if additional help is needed. No action is required by the board.
- IV. 2020 Meeting Calendar (Attachment IV) Mr. Horton introduced the 2020 Meeting calendar. Per the 2019 Federal Certification Review. Mr. Horton shared that we are going to need more discussions in our meetings as there are many Federal Certifications Review Recommendations that need to be addressed. Initial proposal of rotating the meetings would not work from the previous consensus. With the help of Ms. Cook, Mr. Horton presented some other state MPO meeting schedules for consideration and comparison. Heavy discussion was shared and numerous scenarios considered to make it productive for both entities. Ultimately, it was recommended that the TCC meet at 1:00 pm and then the TAC at 3:30. Mr. Eckard asked

for a motion. From the TCC, Mr. Williams offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Berry. The motion was unanimously approved by the TCC. From the TAC, Ms. Cato offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Townsend. The motion was unanimously approved by the TAC.

- V. PL Funding Allocation for FY 2020-2021- Mr. Horton explained that the MPO could have a 20% cut next year over this current year, as a result of reduced PL funding. This is for information purposes only, but doing so to build understanding that next year's total work program may be adjusted to address a smaller budget. A budget adjustment also becomes an opportunity to update local assessments, which provide local match for the MPO budget. Mr. Dillinger clarified the timing of the new estimates. Mr. Starr clarified the context of the MPO budget within the larger COG budget. Mr. Horton concluded that funding would be further addressed at the January 2020 meeting. Mr. Eckard asked for further questions and thanked Mr. Horton.
- VI. Regional Job Flow Trends- Mr. Dellinger wanted to share MSA Job Flows and some of the numbers that may or may not surprise members. Mr. Dellinger referred to an application called OntheMap. He shared in detail what the data reflects. Graphs of the percentage of Hickory MSA workers was explained as well as those located outside the region. Comparison was made of the last seven years. Mr. Dellinger then went into great discussion regarding Maps and all of the county to county inflow and outflow. Further discussion was had regarding how this impacts our counties. Mr. Dellinger shared as long as the links and bonds stay the same we will be fine. So much depends on the numbers we get back from the census and how we grow which he reminded everyone of the importance of the Census.
- VII. Funding Source Modifications for Projects I-5915A and C-5196- Mr. Horton shared that the STIP office reached out to us to explain funding modifications for two area projects. The active interchange project would receive funding, thereby freeing up future funding for LAPP projects. Mr. Marshall stated the City of Hickory supported the NCDOT request. Mr. Eckard asked if there were any questions and gave consent.
- VIII. Prioritization 6.0 Carryover Project list- Mr. Horton shared we must decide as an organization about our carryover project list for prioritization. Mr. Horton shared a slide listing all carryover projects by county. Mr. Eckard asked if there were any questions and gave consent to submit the project list.
- **IX. NCDOT Update** NCDOT presented the following updates:
  - Board of Transportation Mr. Pope gave a brief overall update and asked for questions
  - Division 11 Mr. Weisz shared a handout and went over a couple of the projects that should be completed by early spring.
  - Division 12 Mr. Stafford shared that as far as construction on Hwy 16 that is still
    ongoing and in the future they hope to have a handout. He also discussed 321A and
    gave an update on the process of getting a right a-way. Barbara Beatty asked about
    traffic flow on Hwy 16 and her concerns on the stoplights and gridlocks. Backed up
    constantly. Mr. Stafford agreed they will take a look at this.
  - Division 13 Ms. Hannah Cook gave updates on Burke County, including I-40 progress and the completion of some of the projects. A handout was provided with detailed updates.
  - NCDOT-TPD Ms. Pam Cook gave an update and asked those present to refer to the newsletter handout for additional information.
- X. Added public comments or announcements: No Public comments.

**Adjournment –** As there was no other business, Mr. Eckard thanked our guests and adjourned the meeting at 3:21 PM. The next meetings will be held in January and a notice will be sent.

#### **Bike Plan Amendment Summary**

Adopted by county governments across the GHMPO region in 2014, the Western Piedmont Bicycle Plan (WPBP) provides a framework for improving bicycle transportation, serving as a blueprint for developing both regional and local connectivity. The plan has five goals:

- Design our region's communities as places where bicycle use is valued as a significant transportation mode.
- Connect key bike routes to individual communities across the region.
- Encouraging bicycle use for different purposes, ages, and skill levels.
- Bicycling provides and improves the community's physical and mental health.
- Strengthen the economic impact of bicycling.

Since the adoption of the WPBP, multi-use paths have emerged as a more desired facility along suburban, moderate-speed, multi-lane thoroughfares. This proposed amendment will incorporate recommendations from newer community, area, or comprehensive plans by adding multi-use paths as recommended facilities to certain high-priority segments.

#### **Purpose**

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) outlines transportation planning tasks to be conducted during the fiscal year. The UPWP sets the budget for these items and identifies the funding sources. MPO staff is responsible for ensuring completion of the planning tasks identified in the UPWP.

#### **Federal Requirements**

The FAST Act envisions a transportation system that maximizes mobility and accessibility and protects the human and natural environments. This is achieved through a Continuing, Cooperative, and Comprehensive (3-C) transportation planning process that results in a long-range plan and short-range program of projects. A Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is required to develop a long-range plan and a short-range transportation improvement program that provide for the development and integrated management and operation of transportation systems and facilities that will function as an intermodal transportation system for the planning area and integral part of the state and nation.

#### **SUMMARY OF REQUEST:**

WPCOG serves as the lead planning agency for the Greater Hickory MPO. Each year, the WPCOG assesses dues to its local governments. The Policy Board of the WPCOG approves the overall dues, but the Transportation Advisory Committee has purview over the portion used to fulfill the required local match for Federal transportation funding.

Per the attached NCDOT letter, PL funding next year is decreasing by 54%. Somewhat offsetting this cut, \$80,000 in Statewide Planning Research (SPR) funding will be restored next year. Section 5303 funds increased by \$13,250. As a result of these funding changes, next year's federal and state funding for the MPO is expected to be 20% less than the present fiscal year.

Staff proposes only a 5% reduction in transportation assessments. This is intended to avoid significant fluctuations in local government assessments from year to year. It is likely no MPO assessment increases will be required for the next few years with this approach. Reducing the MPO assessments by 5% also maintains comparable levels of transportation planning services to our local governments.

Based on the direction of the TCC and TAC at the previous meeting, staff also proposes to utilize the annually estimated population to apportion the assessments. This is intended to more fairly distribute assessments from year to year, as well as avoid more significant fluctuation following the 2020 Census. The attached table shows a comparison of last year and this year to show how the collective transportation assessments are decreasing for virtually all local governments.

**ACTION REQUESTED:** Staff requests TCC to review and recommend TAC approve the FY2020-21 transportation assessments.

### RESOLUTION ENDORSING SAFETY PERFORMANCE MEASURES ESTABLISHED BY THE NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

A motion was made by	and seconded by	for the adoption of
the following resolution, and upon being put	to a vote was duly adop	ted on the 22 <sup>nd</sup> of January, 2020

- WHEREAS, the Greater Hickory Metropolitan Planning Organization has been designated by the Governor of the State of North Carolina as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) responsible, together with the State, for the comprehensive, continuing, and cooperative transportation planning process for the MPO's metropolitan planning area; and;
- WHEREAS, the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) final rule (23 CFR Part 490) requires States to set targets for five safety performance measures annually, by August 31, and;
- WHEREAS, the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) has established targets for five performance measures based on five year rolling averages for: (1) Number of Fatalities, (2) Rate of Fatalities per 100 million Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT), (3) Number of Serious Injuries, (4) Rate of Serious Injuries per 100 million VMT, and (5) Number of Non-Motorized (bicycle and pedestrian) Fatalities and Non-motorized Serious Injuries, and;
- WHEREAS, the NCDOT coordinated the establishment of safety targets with the 19 Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) in North Carolina continually through outreach conducted by NCDOT's Mobility and Safety Group and;
- **WHEREAS**, the NCDOT officially establishes and reports the safety targets in the Highway Safety Improvement Program annual report by August 31, of each year and;
- WHEREAS, the MPO's may establish safety targets by agreeing to plan and program projects that contribute toward the accomplishment of the State's targets for each measure or establish its own target within 180 days of the State establishing and reporting its safety targets in the HSIP annual report.
- **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Greater Hickory MPO agrees to plan and program projects that contribute toward the accomplishment of the State's targets as *noted below for each of the aforementioned performance measures:* 
  - 1. For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce total fatalities by 6.23 percent each year from 1,396.4 (2014-2018 average) to 1,227.8 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
  - 2. For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the fatality rate by 5.39 percent each year from 1.211 (2014-2018 average) to 1.084 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.

- 3. For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce total serious injuries by 8.54 percent each year from 3,362.6 (2014-2018 average) to 2,812.8 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- 4. For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the serious injury rate by 7.64 percent each year from 2.886 (2014-2018 average) to 2.462 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- 5. For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the total non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries by 7.13 percent each year from 494.6 (2014-2018 average) to 426.6 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that by approval of this resolution, an amendment is hereby made to the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan adopted on July 25, 2018, by the Greater Hickory MPO.
